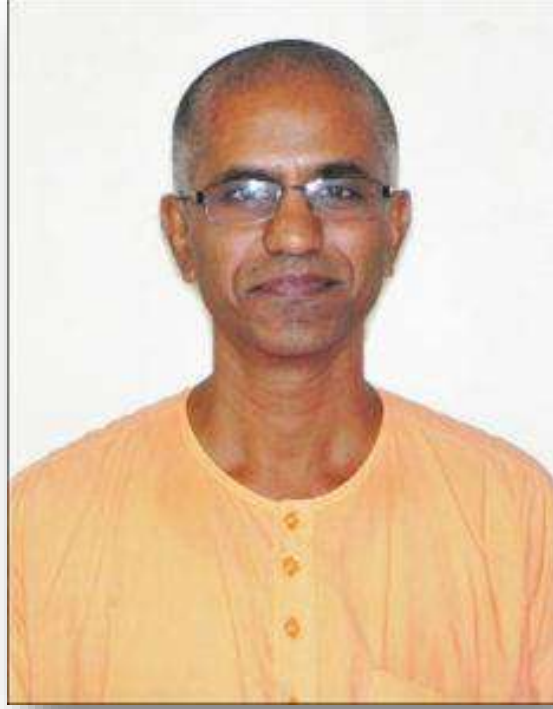

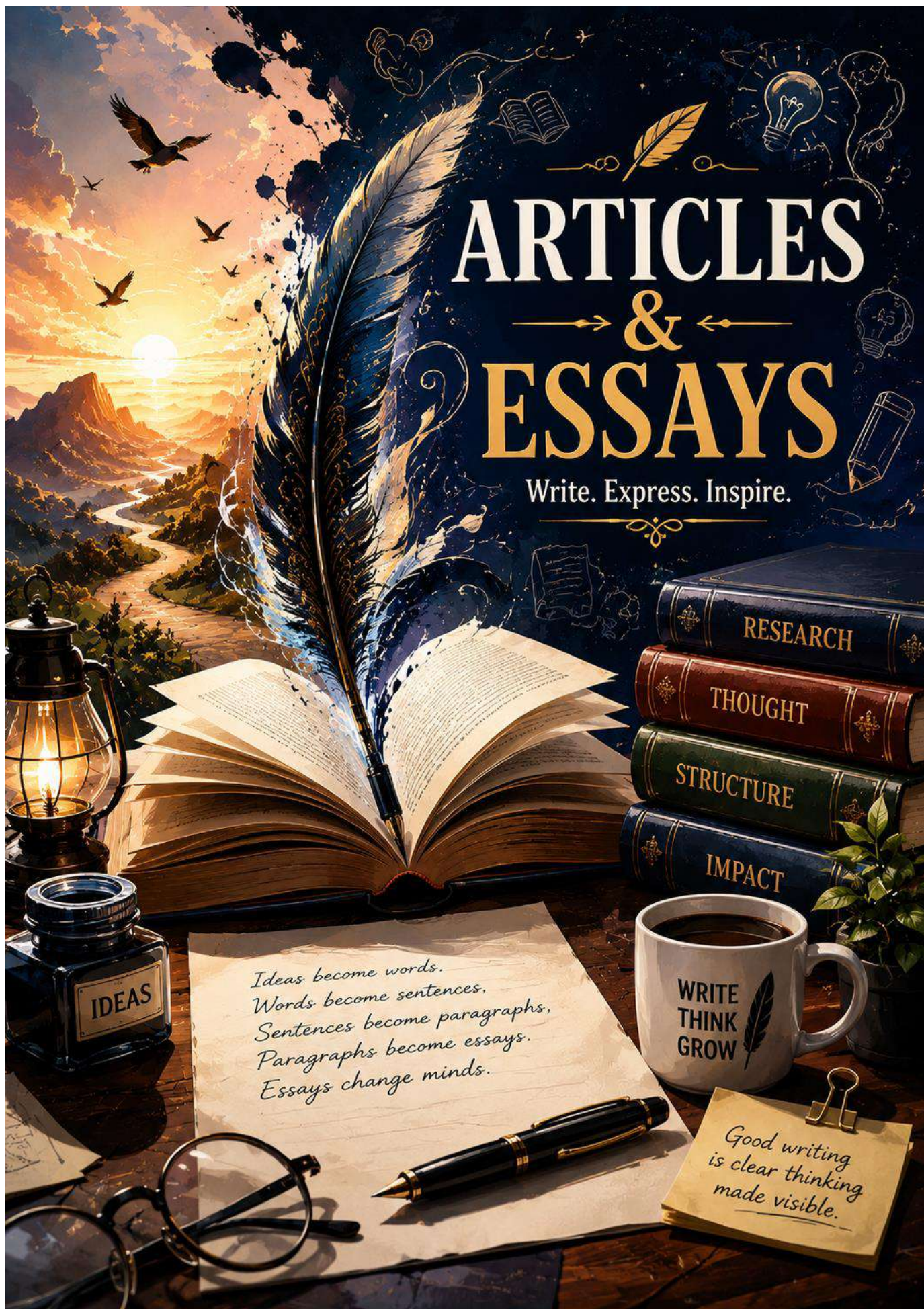

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Sita Ma

Rama and Sita are the ideal of the Indian nation. All children, especially girls, worship Sita. The height of a woman's ambition is to be like Sita, the pure, the devoted, the all-suffering! When you study these characters, you can at once find out how different is the ideal in India from that of the West. For the race, Sita stands as the ideal of suffering. The West says "Do! Show your power by doing." India says, "Show your power by suffering." The West has solved the problem of how much a man can have: India has solved the problem of how little a man can have.

The two extremes, you see. Sita is typical of India - the idealised India. The question is not whether she ever lived, whether the story is history or not, we know that the ideal is there. There is no other Puranika story that has so permeated the whole nation, so entered into its very life, and has so tingled in every drop of blood of the race, as this ideal of Sita. Sita is the name in India for everything that is good, pure and holy -everything that in woman we call womanly.

If a priest has to bless a woman he says, "Be Sita!" If he blesses a child, he says "Be Sita!" They are all children of Sita, and are struggling to be Sita, the patient, the all-suffering, the ever-faithful, the ever-pure wife. Through all this suffering she experiences, there is not one harsh word against Rama.

She takes it as her own duty, and performs her own part in it. Think of the terrible injustice of her being exiled to the forest! But Sita knows no bitterness. That is, again, the Indian Says the ancient Buddha, "When a man hurts you, and you turn back to hurt him, that would not cure the first injury; it would only create in the world one more wickedness." Sita was a true Indian by nature; she never returned injury.

You may exhaust the literature of the world that is past, and I may assure you that you will have to exhaust the literature of the world of the future, before finding another Sita. Sita is unique; that character was depicted once and for all. There may have been several Ramas, perhaps, but never more than one Sita! She is the very type of the true Indian woman, for all the Indian ideals of a perfected woman have grown out of that one life of Sita; and here she stands these thousands of years, commanding the worship of every man, woman, and child throughout the length and breadth of the land of Aryavarta. There she will always be, this glorious Sita, purer than purity itself, all patience, and all suffering.

She who suffered that life of suffering without a murmur, she the ever - chaste and ever - pure wife, she the ideal of the people, the ideal of the gods, the great our national God she must always remain. And every one of us knows her too well to require much delineation. All our mythology may vanish, even our Vedas may depart, and our Sanskrit language may vanish for ever, but so long as there will be five Hindus living here, even if only speaking the most vulgar patois, there will be the story of Sita present. Mark my words: Sita has gone into the very vitals of our race. She is there in the blood of every Hindu man and woman; we are all children of Sita. Any attempt to modernise our women, if it tries to take our women away from that ideal of Sita- is immediately a failure, as we see every day. The women of India must grow and develop in the footprints of Sita, and that is the only way.

Sita to say that she was pure is a blasphemy. She was purity itself embodied - the most beautiful character that ever lived on earth. A Bhakta should be like Sita before Rama. He might be thrown into all kinds of difficulties. Sita did not mind her sufferings; she centred herself in Rama. Rama is considered the type of the Absolute, and Sita that of Power. We have no time to go over all the life of Sita, but I will quote a passage from her life that is very much suited to the ladies of this country.

The picture opens when she was in the forest with her husband, whither they were banished. There was a female sage whom they both went to see. Her fasts and devotions had emaciated her body. Sita approached this sage and bowed down before her. The sage placed her hand on the head of Sita and said: "It is a great blessing to possess a beautiful body; you have that. It is a greater blessing to have a noble husband; you have that. It is the greatest blessing to be perfectly obedient to such a husband; you are that. You must be happy".

Sita replied, "Mother, I am glad that God has given me a beautiful body and that I have so devoted a husband. But as to the third blessing, I do not know whether I obey him or he obeys me. One thing alone I remember, that when he took by the hand before the sacrificial fire-whether it was a reflection of the fire or whether God himself made it appear to me I found that I was his and he was mine. And since then, I have found that I am the complement of his life, and he of mine".

1. Physical Description & Parameters

The valari is typically 30–50 cm in length, constructed from hardwood or forged iron, with a mass up to 500 g for metal variants. It consists of two limbs set at an obtuse angle: one thin and tapering (the striking end), the other rounded to form a handle. Its asymmetric geometry, combined with a spinning throw, generates aerodynamic lift and gyroscopic precession.

2. Coordinate System

Define a right-handed Cartesian coordinate system for the analysis:

- $\mathbf{x}$ — horizontal (direction of throw)
- $\mathbf{y}$ — vertical (upward positive)
- $\mathbf{z}$ — lateral (perpendicular to throw, right-hand rule)

3. Rigid Body Kinematics

3.1 Moment of Inertia

Approximating each limb as a slender rod of length $L/2$ and mass $m/2$, the combined moment of inertia about the centre of mass is:

$$I_{cm} = (1/3) (m/2) (L/2)^2 \times 2 = mL^2 / 12$$

For an asymmetric two-limb body at inter-limb angle θ_0 , the corrected form accounts for angular geometry:

$$I_{cm} = (mL^2 / 12) (1 + \cos\theta_0)$$

3.2 Angular Momentum

The angular momentum vector about the spin axis ω (normal to the plane of the valari) is:

$$\vec{L} = I_{cm} \cdot \vec{\omega} = I_{cm} \cdot \omega_0 \hat{\omega}$$

4. Aerodynamic Forces

Each limb acts as a rotating airfoil. The relative air velocity at a point distance r from the centre of mass is:

$$\vec{v}_{rel}(r) = \vec{v}_{cm} + \vec{\omega} \times \vec{r}$$

4.1 Lift on a Rotating Limb

The differential lift force on an elemental strip dr at distance r :

$$dF_L = (1/2) \rho C_L c v_{rel}^2(r) dr$$

Integrating over limb half-length $\ell = L/2$, with $\vec{v}_{rel}(r) = \vec{v}_0 + \vec{\omega}r$:

$$F_L = (1/2) \rho C_L c [v_0^2 \ell + v_0 \omega \ell^2 + \omega^2 \ell^3 / 3]$$

Notation: ρ = air density (1.225 kg/m³), C_L = lift coefficient (0.8–1.2), c = chord width, $\ell = L/2$

4.2 Drag Force

The translational drag force opposing the centre-of-mass velocity:

$$F_D = (1/2) \rho C_D A v_{cm}^2$$

where $C_D \approx 0.4$ – 0.7 and A is the projected cross-sectional area.

5. Equations of Motion (Translational)

The three translational equations of motion are:

$$m \ddot{x} = -F_D \cos\phi$$

$$m \ddot{y} = F_L - mg - F_D \sin\phi$$

$$m \ddot{z} = F_{gyro}$$

The gyroscopic lateral force (which creates the characteristic curved flight path) is:

$$F_{gyro} = I_{cm} \cdot \vec{\omega} \cdot \dot{\theta} / v_{cm}$$

5.1 Trajectory Equations

Under the ballistic approximation (neglecting lateral deviation initially):

$$x(t) = v_0 \cos\phi \cdot t - (F_D / 2m) t^2$$

$$y(t) = v_0 \sin\phi \cdot t - (1/2) g t^2 + (F_L / 2m) t^2$$

The effective vertical acceleration is reduced by aerodynamic lift:

$$a_y = F_L/m - g$$

6. Gyroscopic Precession & Lateral Deviation

The valari is capable of executing spinning motion in the vertical axis, horizontal axis, or without spin. The key physical mechanism for curved flight is gyroscopic precession.

The precession rate from an applied aerodynamic torque τ is:

$$\dot{\Omega} = \tau / (I_{cm} \cdot \omega)$$

The torque arises from the lift asymmetry between the advancing and retreating limbs:

$$\tau \approx \rho C_L c \ell^2 \cdot v_0 \omega \ell$$

The resulting lateral displacement as a function of time:

$$z(t) = (1/2) \dot{\Omega} \cdot v_{cm} \cdot t^2$$

This lateral arc is the signature of the valari's flight — enabling it to strike around shields or approach targets at an oblique angle.

7. Spin Decay (Rotational Drag)

The angular velocity decays over time due to aerodynamic torque on the spinning limbs:

$$I_{cm} \dot{\omega} = -k\omega \omega^2$$

where the rotational drag coefficient is:

$$k\omega = (1/2) \rho C_D c \ell^4 / 4$$

Solving the differential equation yields the spin decay function:

$$\omega(t) = \omega_0 / [1 + (k\omega\omega_0 / I_{cm}) t]$$

This shows that spin (and thus gyroscopic stability) decreases hyperbolically with time, setting a practical effective range.

8. Impact Kinetics

8.1 Kinetic Energy at Impact

Total kinetic energy at the moment of impact (translational + rotational):

$$E_k = (1/2) m v_{\text{impact}}^2 + (1/2) I_{cm} \omega(t_f)^2$$

8.2 Impact Force

Assuming contact duration $\Delta t \approx 2\text{--}5$ ms, the impulse-momentum theorem gives:

$$F_{\text{impact}} = m \Delta v / \Delta t + I_{\text{cm}} \omega / (\ell \cdot \Delta t)$$

Numerical example for a metal valari ($m = 0.5$ kg, $v_0 = 25$ m/s, $\omega = 40$ rad/s, $\Delta t = 3$ ms):

$$F_{\text{impact}} \approx (0.5 \times 25) / 0.003 + (I_{\text{cm}} \times 40) / (0.2 \times 0.003) \approx 4,167 + 444 \approx 4.6 \text{ kN}$$

9. Range Estimation

The maximum horizontal range occurs at the optimal release angle ϕ^* and is governed by the effective gravitational acceleration reduced by aerodynamic lift:

$$R = v_0^2 \sin(2\phi^*) / g_{\text{eff}}$$

$$g_{\text{eff}} = g - F_L/m$$

For moderate spin providing $F_L \approx 0.3$ mg:

$$g_{\text{eff}} = 0.7g \approx 6.87 \text{ m/s}^2$$

$$R_{\text{max}} = (25)^2 / 6.87 \approx 91 \text{ m}$$

This theoretical maximum of ~91 m agrees closely with Colonel Welsh's historical account of the valari's effective range of up to 100 yards (~91 m).

10. Throw Types & Flight Modes

The valari can be thrown in three primary modes, each corresponding to a different physical regime. A lethal throw is aimed at the neck; a non-lethal throw at the ankles or knees; a blunt blow carries no spin.

Table 2: Flight Modes by Throw Type

Throw Type	ω_0	Dominant Force	Path
Lethal (neck)	High	Gyroscopic + Translational	Curved, horizontal arc
Capture (ankles)	Medium	Lift + Gravity	Low, lateral arc

11. Dimensionless Valari Number (Va)

A dimensionless flight parameter analogous to the Strouhal number characterises the dominant flight regime:

$$Va = \omega L / (2v_0)$$

Table 3: Flight Regimes by Va

Va Value	Flight Regime
$Va < 0.3$	Ballistic-dominated, straight flight
$0.3 \leq Va < 0.7$	Mixed flight, moderate lateral deviation
$Va \geq 0.7$	Gyroscopically-dominated, pronounced curved/returning path

Example calculation: $\omega = 40$ rad/s, $L = 0.4$ m, $v_0 = 20$ m/s:

$$Va = (40 \times 0.4) / (2 \times 20) = 0.4 \rightarrow \text{Mixed flight regime}$$

Conclusion

The valari's effectiveness as a weapon arises from a sophisticated interplay of classical mechanics. The asymmetric two-limb geometry generates aerodynamic lift that both extends range and enables altitude control. Gyroscopic precession from the spinning throw induces a predictable lateral arc, allowing the weapon to approach targets obliquely. The rotational kinetic energy stored in the spinning body adds substantially to the impact force at contact.

The Valari Number Va provides a single dimensionless parameter capturing this balance: low Va produces a ballistic, predictable trajectory ideal for blunt trauma, while high Va produces the distinctive curved path exploited by skilled throwers for evasive strikes. The model predicts a maximum effective range of ~91 m for a 0.5 kg metal valari, consistent with historical accounts.

The valari is a beautifully optimised ancient design — one whose aerodynamic and gyroscopic principles were empirically discovered centuries before formal mechanics was established.

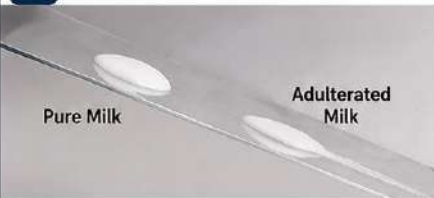

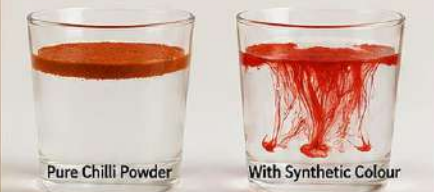

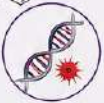

- ❖ The Twelve Zodiac Signs (Rashis)
- ❖ The Twenty-Seven Nakshatras

form an intricate cosmic matrix that shapes earthly life.

Each Nakshatra is associated with a sacred tree species. By planting and nurturing these trees, the ancients sought to harmonize human existence with cosmic rhythms.

A Comprehensive Arrangement of 108 Sacred Trees

While many Nakshatra gardens across India house 27 trees - one for each Nakshatra - the Nakshatra Vanam at Ramakrishna Mission Vidyalaya is distinguished by its comprehensive design.

This sacred grove consists of: 108 Trees

The number 108 holds profound spiritual symbolism in Indian philosophy:

Each Nakshatra has four padas (quarters)

- ❖ $27 \text{ Nakshatras} \times 4 \text{ padas} = 108$
